# Mastering the Dual Haki: Reading vs. Writing



## The Sniper's Eye (Reading Objectives – 10 Marks)

- ⚓ **Explicit & Implicit:** Spot the obvious facts and the hidden hints.
- 💀 **Range:** Gather intelligence from the entire passage.
- ⚓ **Selection:** Filter out excess examples; keep only relevant targets.

## The Navigator's Hand (Writing Objectives – 5 Marks)

- ⚓ **Organisation:** Chart a logical route for the reader.
- 💀 **Own Words:** Forge a new map; do not copy the original text.
- ⚓ **Concision:** Communicate clearly and efficiently.

# The Navigator's Timeline: A 3-Island Route



## Island 1: Preparation (Before)

- Highlight the specific question focus.
- Underline potential points in the text.
- Group repeated ideas under overarching umbrellas.

## Island 2: Execution (During)

- Number your route for optimal flow.
- Draft continuously, keeping the 120-word limit in sight.

## Island 3: Review (After)

- The Non-Reader Test: Would an adult who hasn't seen the text understand this?
- Check against your plan to ensure no loot was left behind.

Text B: Is cycle touring right for you?

Perhaps, like me, you find it impossible to imagine that your regular old body, the one that struggles just walking up a steep hill, could handle riding the vast distances involved in a cycle trip. Truth is, we discover that we're capable of so much more than we ever thought possible.

At the end of a long day, I was often tired, sore and dreading getting back on the bike the next morning. But after a night's sleep, I'd feel excited and ready to climb back in the saddle to see what the day would bring.

Before leaving on tour, I often wondered if cycle touring might turn out to be boring – all that pedalling. I turned out to be right on this one: some days on the bike are dull. But the boredom is far outweighed by the excitement of seeing flowers and animals that you'd never notice from a car.

Cycle touring's not for you if you want to check off every famous sight in your guidebook. **The Chronological Serpent**

## The Threat

Tracking through the passage chronologically without planning. Results in rambling, overlong answers that abruptly stop at 120 words.



## The Counter-Attack

Group similar ideas together logically before writing.

## The Threat

Losing sight of the focus. Offering both pros AND cons when the prompt only asked for attractions.



## The Counter-Attack

Highlight the exact focus word in the prompt and ruthlessly ignore anything else.

# Beware the Grand Line Sea Monsters (Part 2)



**The Copycat Kraken**

## The Threat

Ripping sections straight from the text. Creates unclear, incomplete explanations and scores zero for Writing Quality.



## The Counter-Attack

Recast the material entirely in your own words and sentence structures.



**The Off-Map Leviathan**

## The Threat

Forgetting this is a Reading test. Adding outside knowledge, personal opinions, or drifting into unrelated discussions.



## The Counter-Attack

Stick strictly to the text. If the author didn't say it, it doesn't go on your map.

# The Ultimate Treasure: Exam Day Code

## 1. Locate the X:

Read the question twice.  
Find the exact focus.

## 2. Gather the Loot:

Underline relevant points  
across the whole text.

## 3. Forge the Map:

Group related points  
under umbrella concepts.
